"Blessed are the debonair, for they will inherit the earth." Matthew 5:5 – translated from the French

In a French translation of verses known as the beatitudes, the phrase that the Englishspeaking world knows as, "blessed are the meek", is translated as, "blessed are the debonair". The dictionary defines "debonair" as confident, stylish, and charming, but when the Bible was translated into French in the mid-1500s, to be "debonair" meant something quite different:

"A person who is not an idolater, one who hasn't gotten hooked up in anything worldly, one who is so sophisticated as to know wealth for what it is, and that it isn't everything ... This is a person who has a kind of centeredness that doesn't let the idols of this world capture it. It's a kind of debonair in which you sit lightly on the offerings and temptations of this world because you have a vision of something better."¹

The kind of people who will inherit the earth are those who dance lightly on it. Those who already instinctively know that human beings have trampled across the earth in hob-nailed boots. Those who understand that wealth isn't everything. Those who don't get caught up in the offerings of the world because they have a vision of something better.

When it comes to climate destruction, dancing lightly doesn't mean tiptoeing around leaving no trace. It means throwing off the temptations of consumption and greed, and instead, loving outrageously. The question is, what does it look like in terms of living life and caring for the earth? Maybe it looks like putting the Bible's life words into practice; an actual lived reality of treating the world the way we are supposed to. Not just knowing that we *can* change things but *doing* it. Not just tipping our hat at the idea of consuming less, and loving more, but choosing to do it. Choosing to be debonair, and dancing lightly where we have been conditioned to stomp.

1–7 November EarthFirst

VerseFirst, Lifewords social media Bible engagement initiative, is currently running EarthFirst via Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter. Aimed at young people, EarthFirst offers a way to engage with the Bible and respond to the climate emergency, using images alongside verses that reflect creation and our stewardship of the planet.

- VerseFirst was created with the aim to reach young people and encourage them to start their day with a Bible verse. This new campaign uses verses that reflect creation and our stewardship of the planet, focussing specifically on verses from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. Pray that as we engage with these issues from God's perspective that we and our worldview would be changed, and that we would be challenged to respond with love and justice.
- "Activism against climate breakdown is being strongly led by young people," says Elizabeth King, from the Lifewords UK team. "This campaign from VerseFirst is a great platform to encourage them to be introduced to Scripture that relates to this touchstone issue of our times." Please pray that as young people engage with the images and Bible verses that they would understand more about who God is. Pray that they would share the posts with their friends and be encouraged to engage them in the Bible and the good news of Jesus.
- Along with the ravages of Covid-19, the fight for the future of the planet is the most important issue right now. 15–21 November Australia and New Zealand

For Lifewords offices around the world, the pandemic has meant adapting to new ways of ministering. Dan Hardie updates us on the work in Australia:

- "Orders for resources have been down," says Lifewords Australia Director, Dan. "Many of the chaplains, churches, ministries, and partners have had their activities restricted by social distancing rules and closures. We've been speaking and praying with chaplains who are not allowed on campus to do their work – in prisons, hospitals, care facilities, and more. Our prayer list has grown and both Vera [part of Lifewords team in Australia] and I have been talking with key partners each week and sharing in their burden." Give thanks for the support Dan and Vera are able to offer to Lifewords supporters and partners. Pray for these individuals and groups who have had to rethink and change the way they minister. Pray that despite restrictions that the communities they serve would be reached and looked after.
- "We're just starting to see orders for our literature resources start to come back in both New Zealand and Australia," says Dan. "We expect this to grow as we move into the Christmas season." Pray that as people adapt to the restrictions imposed by the pandemic that they would be able to find ways to share good news. Pray that as Christmas plans are put in place that Christians in Australia would be inspired to reach out and share resources in new and creative ways.
- "Community-based public benevolent institutions like Kogarah Storehouse in New South Wales have been flooded with requests for support since the Covid-19 restrictions have taken effect. Kogarah Storehouse serves those who are needy, providing food, welfare and social service assistance, and support for vulnerable women. Vera has been actively joining their weekly activities, setting up a booklet stand, and serving the poor and needy." Give thanks for initiatives like Kogarah Storehouse who are offering vital support during the pandemic. Pray that they would have the resources and volunteers they need, and that they would be kept safe and healthy as they serve.

22–28 November

Answered prayer in Zimbabwe

Pastor Chikadzhe uses Pavement Project with young people in Zimbabwe. Here she shares a story of transformation, hope and God's provision:

• "It is an afternoon in June. Most people are indoors because of fear of the coronavirus and also fear of the authorities that are restricting movements.

Maurice*, who is 12 years old, comes to the children's home. I take him to our counselling room. He sits down with a sigh and immediately I begin talking to him about coronavirus and whether he understands what he should do to protect himself from it. He recites the basic regulations like they are programmed into him." Pray for children like Maurice, who are living in the midst of great uncertainty, with restricted access to friends, school, and wider family.

- "I pull down my green bag, which is always hung on the wall waiting for times like this." says Pastor Chikadzhe. "I get Maurice to talk and ask him about the worst thing that happened to him. He tells me that his father left some time before the lockdown ... he thinks his father will not be coming back to the family. His mother, who was employed at one of the bakeries in town, has not been going to work since the start of the lockdown. The boy feels hungry and vulnerable, and he compares himself to a rat. I share a Bible story with him and tell him that Jesus loves him and wants him to be part of God's family. I go on to tell the story of how Jesus miraculously fed the 4,000 and I pray for him, and offer him a pocket card – he chooses the image of the protective hands. When I ask him again what he can compare himself to, he says he compares himself to a tree that is secure on the ground. Before he goes, he says to me, 'Pastor may I have a Bible so that I can read for myself at home.' I am a bit surprised, because most children do not ask for a Bible from me, but I give him my NIV Bible, and he thanks me and leaves." Praise God for people like Pastor Chikadzhe who are working to care for and give hope to young people. Give thanks for the transforming power of God's Word, and for the hunger Maurice has to read more.
- "I go back to the prayer room and pray that God may provide for the family in a miraculous way like he provided for the 4,000," says Pastor Chikadzhe. "The following week as I go out to empty our bin, the boy beckons me to stop and he comes running to me, this time smiling from ear to ear. He tells me that his mother received a phone call to come and collect her travel permit so that she can resume work. I smile calmly and say, 'praise God', but when I get back to my prayer room, I dance before the Lord in ecstasy! I feel glad that God answers prayer!" Praise God for answered prayer and for the provision for Maurice and his family.
